St George's Archive looks after a fascinating collection of post-mortem examinations and case books. This research guide gives a brief overview of this collection and provides a full listing of the volumes held in the Archive (1841-1946).

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


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Brief overview of the Post-Mortem and Case Books

The collection of post-mortem records held in St George's Archives span over one hundred years of history, and were described by pioneering physician Sir William Osler as the 'finest collection of its kind'. Osler stressed the importance of the post mortem in medical education and it has played an important role in the history of the Medical School, today St George's, University of London.

As well as the post-mortem examinations undertaken, the case books chart the bodies which went unexamined, many of which were transported to the nearby Medical School for the teaching of anatomy.



The bound volumes contain manuscript case notes. These provide very detailed reports of each case starting with the patient and presenting the history of the case, with a comprehensive report of the pathological findings made during the detailed examination of the body, including bones, joints, muscles and organs. From the 1880s onwards the case books feature original anatomical drawings.
