All research that is not being reviewed by a nationally recognised Research Ethics Committee (eg: NHS REC), that is being conducted by St George's University London students or staff or research which involves St George's University London students, staff, or data, requires a favourable opinion from the St George's Research Ethics Committee (SGREC) and governance approval by the Research Ethics and Integrity Officer, prior to commencing. We believe that the high quality of the research ethics review is fundamental to our research integrity and culture. This annual statement covers the period 1st August 2021 to 30 June 2022.





Number of Research studies approved by SGREC 2019 -2022



The number of studies increased remarkably from 2019/20 to 2020/21, from 36 research study cases to 75, and stayed at the same level in 2021/2022 with 72 research study cases with more proportional reviews. This year the annual report was produced one month earlier than usual (generally produced by end of July, but end of June this year) to allow the Report to be provided to the Research Committee for the July meeting



Number of Service evaluation and Audit registered by SGREC 2019 -2022

This year there has been a significant increase in the Audit and Service evaluations registered, compared to previous years.

Overall, the St George`s Research Committee has good visibility in the Institutes, efficiency in reviewing cases and support provided to Researchers.
